Ten shows to see at New England museums this fall

POPE.L: SMALL CUP

A legendary performance artist known for inserting himself unceremoniously in the public sphere — a well-known series had him literally crawl on elbows and knees through the streets of Manhattan — Pope L has described himself as "a fisherman of social absurdity." That absurdity has often been the raw material of a strident critique of racial inequity in the US, and has recently made him more visible and relevant than ever: In 2019, New York's Museum of Modern Art mounted a survey of more than 20 years of his work; concurrently, the Whitney Museum of American Art installed a massive new work, "Choir," an industrial water tank installed amid a soundscape that evoked Black Americans' being denied basic access to clean drinking water. "Small Cup," a homecoming of sorts — the artist was a lecturer at Bates College in nearby Lewiston from 1992 to 2010; he's now faculty at the University of Chicago — is very much of a piece. In the video of the live 2008 performance, a herd of goats demolishes a small-scale replica of the US Capitol building, an eerie resonance that these days cuts close to the bone.
